From the Pastor

We continue our study of the shortened form of the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* called the *Compendium*. We are now in the section on the Seven Sacraments of the Church and finishing up with the Sacrament of Holy Matrimony. We will also begin looking at sacramentals. Here are this week's three questions with the catechism's answer and my commentary.

Why is the Christian family called a domestic church? The Christian family is called the domestic church because the family manifests and lives out the communal and familial nature of the Church as the family of God. Each family member, in accord with their own role, exercises the baptismal priesthood and contributes toward making the family a community of grace and of prayer, a school of human and Christian virtue and the place where the faith is first proclaimed to children.

Commentary: The Christian family is the fullness of what every human family should be: a communion of persons united in their worship of God and their commitment to one another in the virtues of faith, hope and love. The Christian family is the Church in microcosm. Nourished by the grace that flows from the sacraments, the family home is a place of worship, prayer, and divine charity.

What are the sacramentals? These are sacred signs instituted by the Church to sanctify different circumstances of life. They include a prayer accompanied by the sign of the cross and other signs. Among the sacramentals which occupy an important place are: blessings, which are the praise of God and a prayer to obtain his gifts, the consecration of persons and the dedication of things for the worship of God.

Commentary: Sacramentals are sacrament-like. Like the sacraments, they contribute to a person's growth in holiness. The sacraments bestow saving grace. Sacramentals cultivate that grace through the use of outward, visible signs. These signs include the sign of the cross, religious images like statues and icons, and other objects that are used in the practice of faith such as rosaries, crucifixes and religious medals. Sacramentals are visible signs of faith that assist believers in the practice of their faith.

What is an exorcism? When the Church asks with its authority in the name of Jesus that a person or object be protected against the power of the Evil One and withdrawn from his dominion, it is called an exorcism. This is done in ordinary form in the rite of Baptism. A solemn exorcism, called a major exorcism, can be performed only by a priest authorized by the bishop.

Commentary: Jesus gives to the Church a share in his authority to vanquish the devil and the powers of darkness allied to him. An exorcism is a prayer that calls upon the power of Jesus to safeguard a person from evil or to withdraw an object from the dominion of the Evil One. Such prayers are always prayed over those about to be baptized. Prayers of exorcism are also used in the blessing of homes and of objects that are used as a part of the exercise of Christian worship and devotion, such as water, oil, and religious images. Exorcisms used in these circumstances are called *minor exorcisms*. They may be given by any priest or deacon. Solemn exorcisms are employed only in circumstances where the Church discerns the presence of demonic possession. This type of prayer, called a *major exorcism*, may only be given by priests appointed by and with the permission of the bishop.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE

Thanks to all of you have pledged so far to the Capital Campaign. Once we have received the required funds (\$278,000), we will go forward with the first phase of our planned improvements: replacing the storm water line that runs from the church to the edge of our property and repaving the church and school parking lot. So far we have collected \$191,075.00.

CONFIRMATION CORNER

Our confirmation candidates met for their first class on Saturday, September 28th. Time seemed to fly by as we got to know each other better and together, we read and reflected on Scripture passages that described who the Spirit is, what the role of the Spirit is in the Church and the role of the Spirit in each of our lives. We watched a short video on the importance of the choices we make and then had a brief introduction to the seven themes of Catholic Social Teaching that will be explored at each of the remaining seven class periods.

Our next class will be on Saturday, October 12 from 10am-12noon in the school library. Tom Trunk, from 40 Days for Life, will be our guest presenter on the Catholic Social Teaching Theme: The Dignity of Human Life. Following his talk, we will go to the Metropolitan Family Planning Center on Greenbelt Road to pray the Rosary for the women who are entering the clinic to have an abortion, and for the clinic workers and the abortion doctor that they have a change of heart and choose life for the unborn babies.
