From the Pastor

We continue our study of the shortened form of the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* called the *Compendium*. We are now in the section on the Seven Sacraments of the Church. This week we will look at the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation, which is very timely for the Season of Lent when the Church urges the faithful to confess their sins in this Sacrament. Here are this week's three questions with the catechism's answer and my commentary.

What are the essential elements of the sacrament of Reconciliation? The essential elements are two: the acts of the penitent who comes to repentance through the action of the Holy Spirit, and the absolution of the priest who in the name of Christ grants forgiveness and determines the ways of making satisfaction.

Commentary: The Holy Spirit is the principal actor in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. It is the Spirit who forms a person's conscience to distinguish right from wrong, who troubles the person's conscience when they have done wrong, who arouses sorrow in the person's heart for the wrong they have done, and who draws the person to confess their wrongs and make amends for them. It is the Spirit who then forgives sins in the Sacrament of Reconciliation through the ministry of the priest-confessor and restores the person to communion with God and the community.

What are the acts of the penitent? They are: a careful examination of conscience; contrition (or repentance), which is perfect when it is motivated by love of God and imperfect if it rests on other motives and which includes the determination not to sin again; confession, which consists in the telling of one's sins to the priest; and satisfaction or the carrying out of certain acts of penance which the confessor imposes upon the penitent to repair the damage caused by sin.

Commentary: From their earliest years, the faithful are taught to make a frequent examination of their conscience, to discern the ways they have been responsive to the impulses of grace in doing what is pleasing to God and the ways they have resisted grace and thereby fallen into sin either through commission (things they did that were wrong) or omission (good things they should have done in a particular situation but failed to do by their own fault). An examination of conscience is frequently done by a review of the Ten Commandments. Many Catholic prayer books contain an "Examination of Conscience" consisting of a series of questions that helps a person undertake a thorough examination of their conscience. When a person becomes aware of their sins through an examination of conscience, they should respond to the prompting of God's grace and repent of their sins, manifesting a genuine sorrow and hatred for their sins. This sorrow and hatred for sins is called contrition. Contrition is called perfect (i.e., fully formed) when one's sorrow is rooted principally in the awareness of how one has offended against the goodness of God. Contrition is called imperfect (i.e., not fully formed) when one's sorrow is rooted more in the awareness of the disadvantage sin brings to oneself. Contrition is meant to lead to confession of sins and a willingness to make satisfaction for one's sins.

Which sins must be confessed? All grave sins not yet confessed, which a careful examination of conscience brings to mind, must be brought to the sacrament of Penance. The confession of serious sins is the only ordinary way to obtain forgiveness.

Commentary: Grave sins are serious offenses against God's goodness. Examples of grave sin are murder, adultery and apostasy (though grave sin is hardly confined to these sins alone). Grave sins are commonly called mortal sins because they destroy the life of charity within a person. Not all sins are mortal. Some are less serious. Though all sin is offensive to God and should be rooted out of one's life, less serious sins, commonly called venial sins, do not destroy the life of charity. They do, however, weaken it. Grave sins must be confessed to a priest in the Sacrament of Reconciliation in order to be forgiven. Venial sins do not need to be confessed in the Sacrament of Reconciliation in order to be forgiven.



Special Needs Ministry --*Helping those with disabilities and their families share in the fullness of our Catholic Faith and Community life.*

For the next few weeks our parish Special Needs Ministry will be publishing articles from the resource, *Opening Doors of Welcome and Justice to Parishioners with Disabilities: A Parish Resource Guide*, a publication of the National Catholic Partnership on Disability (NACP) in Washington, DC. We hope you find these articles informative and helpful.

DEMOGRAPHICS OF DISABILITY

For twenty years, the U.S. Census and national surveys have consistently reported that approximately 20 percent of the population - one person in five - has a disability that limits one or more essential life functions. These resources further report that one family in three has a member with a disability. Figures cited at the July 2000 commemoration of the tenth anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act noted that fifty-four million Americans have some form of disability.

Advocates (such as the International Center for Disability Information) cite an additional two million people who live in institutions and are not counted in the census figures. The National Catholic Partnership on Disability estimates that fourteen million Catholics in the United States live with a disability. The following percentages taken from the 2000 NOD/Harris Survey of Americans with Disabilities (May-June 2000) represent the occurrence of disabilities by category: cognitive 5%, sensory 9%, medical 28% and physical 58%.
