

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE

Thanks to all of you have pledged so far to the Capital Campaign. Once we have received the required funds (\$278,000), we will go forward with the first phase of our planned improvements: replacing the storm water line that runs from the church to the edge of our property and repaving the church and school parking lot. So far we have collected \$182,438.00

As a reminder, there are three ways to redeem your pledge to the parish:

- 1) Faith Direct – If you want to use Faith Direct or are currently using Faith Direct, you need to call Faith Direct at 1-866-507-8757 to set up the Capital Campaign payment plan and schedule, or go on line at www.faithdirect.net to do this. The parish does not do this for you.
- 2) Monthly Envelopes – If you receive monthly envelopes, please use the special white Capital Campaign envelope to make your contribution.
- 3) Check/Cash – If you pay by check, please write Capital Campaign on the check memo line. If you make a cash contribution, please write your name on the envelope so you can be given credit.

Capital Campaign contributions will be included in your tax statement for all registered parishioners who request tax information for 2019.

Even if you decided not to make a pledge, you can still contribute to the Capital Campaign by following the instructions above. Monies collected over and above what is needed for the storm water line, parking lot, church boiler, and improvements to Grenoble Hall, will be placed in a reserve fund for ongoing capital improvements to the parish plant.

Again, thank you for your generosity and commitment to our parish. I am proud to be your pastor!

From the Pastor

We continue our study of the shortened form of the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* called the *Compendium*. We are now in the section on the Seven Sacraments of the Church and looking at the Sacrament of Holy Matrimony. Here are this week's three questions with the catechism's answer and my commentary.

What new element did Christ give to Matrimony? Christ not only restored the original order of matrimony but raised it to the dignity of a sacrament, giving spouses a special grace to live out their marriage as a symbol of Christ's love for his bride the Church: "Husbands, love your wives, as Christ loved the Church" (Ephesians 5:25P)

Commentary: The original order of matrimony established by God in the beginning was a permanent, indissoluble union of husband and wife for the sake of their mutual support and affection and the raising of children. With the Fall and the introduction of disorder into human nature, the human heart became hardened and divorce was permitted under the Law of Moses. But, by his death and resurrection Christ has delivered the human race from its captivity to sin and death, deliverance that is received through faith and baptism and the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. Now Christians, empowered by the Holy Spirit, can once again enter into matrimony with all the graces necessary to live it according to God's original order, and with even greater graces whereby they become sharers in the divine nature, and spouses are able to love each other with the love that Christ has for the Church.

Are all obliged to get married? Matrimony is not an obligation for everyone, especially since God calls some men and women to follow the Lord Jesus in a life of virginity or celibacy for the sake of the Kingdom of Heaven. These renounce the great good of Matrimony to concentrate on the things of the Lord and seek to please him. They become a sign of the absolute supremacy of Christ's love and of the ardent expectation of his glorious return.

Commentary: The commandment "Be fertile and multiply," given to the human race at the time of its creation still applies in general. Thus we see that marriage is still the vocation of the overwhelming majority of men and women. But Christ calls some men and women to a life of virginity and celibacy so that they may be fruitful in another way for the benefit of the whole human race. But whether one is married or unmarried, the Christian vocation is always one of service to God and others.

How is the sacrament of Matrimony celebrated? Since Matrimony establishes spouses in a public state of life in the Church, its liturgical celebration is public, taking place in the presence of a priest (or of a witness authorized by the Church) and other witnesses.

Commentary: Marriage is not a private affair. The marriage of a couple is always inserted into the good of the greater community and, in its own way, serves the greater good, not only by multiplying the members of the human race, but also by forming spouses in the virtues of faith, hope and charity through which they become instruments of Christ's grace and life in the world.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Although New Year's Day has been fixed firmly on January 1 for several hundred years, Labor Day has the feel of a great dividing line between leisure and routine. The pace of life has since picked up, and new schedules and commitments crowd us. In the background is God's call to consider the third commandment, still life-giving and binding, to make holy the Lord's Day by worship and rest. Jews see the Sabbath, Saturday, not so much as a day of worship, but as a day of rest, a day of renewing friendship with God by delighting in the beauty of creation and the joy of family and friends. It is a day for contemplating the wonder of God's creation, but not disturbing it. For Christians in the first three centuries, the Lord's Day, Sunday, was not for rest, but worship. It was a regular work day. People met before dawn, and after Eucharist hurried off to daily routines. Today we come to Mass, but many hurry off to essential work, not a day of rest. The Lord's Day is not the Sabbath, but we can enhance Sundays' ability to transform us if we consider embracing some Sabbath values: having a family meal, going for a walk in a beautiful place, making room in our lives to open ourselves more fully to holiness of life in Christ. --James Field, Copyright (c) J. 
